#### A Reading from Deuteronomy 18:15-20


Reader: A reading from Deuteronomy.

This is what you requested of the LORD your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: "If I hear the voice of the LORD my God anymore, or ever again see this great fire, I will die." Then the LORD replied to me: "They are right in what they have said. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak—that prophet shall die."

A Reading from 1 Corinthians 8:1-13 |

Reader: A reading from the first Epistle to the Corinthians.

Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him.

Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as in fact there are many gods and many lords—yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist.

It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

The Gospel | Mark 1:21-28

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus and his disciples went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.



Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.


People: It is right to give him thanks and praise.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who forever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:











The people stand or kneel.

Then the Celebrant continues.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or to lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

Celebrant and People: We remember his death,

We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory.

The Celebrant continues.

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and forever. *AMEN*.





# How We Helped Grassroots Feed the Homeless at Jessup Despite a Recent Snowfall, and How You Can Do Your Part This Winter

In a pinch, who do you call? The answer: Christ Church! For our homeless friends at the Day Resource Center (DRC), once again our volunteers came through on Saturday, Jan. 20, as Central Maryland was digging out from Friday's snowfall. A family emergency had occurred, leaving an unexpected gap in the breakfast menu for midday.

The <u>Grassroots Crisis Intervention Center</u> operates the DRC, located at the Leola Dorsey Center in Jessup where a Christ Church team led by Shahra Toth provides a hot meal on the second Monday of each month. The DRC staff contacted her and other faith-based groups who regularly serve there. Altogether the menu lacked six pans of scrambled eggs. Shahra and George Toth responded by shopping and preparing two pans. That's 30 eggs in each pan, with added cheese and ham.

The snowstorm complicated matters, as no one knew until early Saturday if the DRC could open to welcome its homeless friends. To assist the Toths, Suzanne Ziobro accepted the role of the driver as Shahra and George made the dropoff in icy circumstances. The leaders of two other groups responded, too, and the DRC staff members cooked a mound of bacon. They – and the DRC's cold and hungry diners – were greatly pleased! In what has become a routine donation for the Toths and their neighbors, George donated warm blankets for the DRC inventory (see photos on our website).

The Outreach-led team next prepares and serves meals for two Grassroots facilities on Monday, Feb.12. You can sign up online and read about the differing procedures for the meals on our **DRC online signup form** or our **Grassroots online signup form**.

Both the DRC and the Live-In Facility have wider needs for their pantries and welcome in-kind donations to be dropped off for delivery on the second Mondays. Look for the latest needs list on bulletin boards at church or online, under the words "Related Files," on each signup form.

If you wish to do more, parishioners are encouraged to sign up individually to provide the evening meal at the Live-In Facility. Pick a date to provide an entree and side dishes, or just the entree, for the 50 adults and children. For example, a parishioner ordered more than a dozen pizzas to be delivered for the evening meal on MLK Day.

Grassroots <u>suggests ideas</u> to make choosing your menu as easy as possible. Go to Grassroots' <u>sign-up list</u>, which has multiple open slots through Feb. 29. (Leap Day is taken, but Valentine's Day is still open. And this year, Ash Wednesday falls on Feb. 14.)

#### Look for the FISH Bin Inside the Parish Hall During Cold Weather

FISH of Howard County needs non-perishable foods and toiletries, which we collect in the basket at the altar or in a marked yellow bin that has been moved inside the Parish Hall during cold weather. FISH provides committed support to select families in need. The neighbors you help give thanks for all you do in their support.
