Pilgrimage

— a journey to a special, significant or sacred space

- Physical journey - Trusting and traveling into the “Deep South” with people I didn’t know
- Spiritual purpose - Seeking closer connection to God and a renewed sense of purpose
- Inner transformation - Using the journey for prayer, gaining clarity, and finding inspiration
- Sacred space - Engaging with African-American and Civil Rights History of Alabama
- Connection - Feeling part of the civil rights experience, feeling connection to my Dad (deceased), fellowship with other pilgrims/new friends

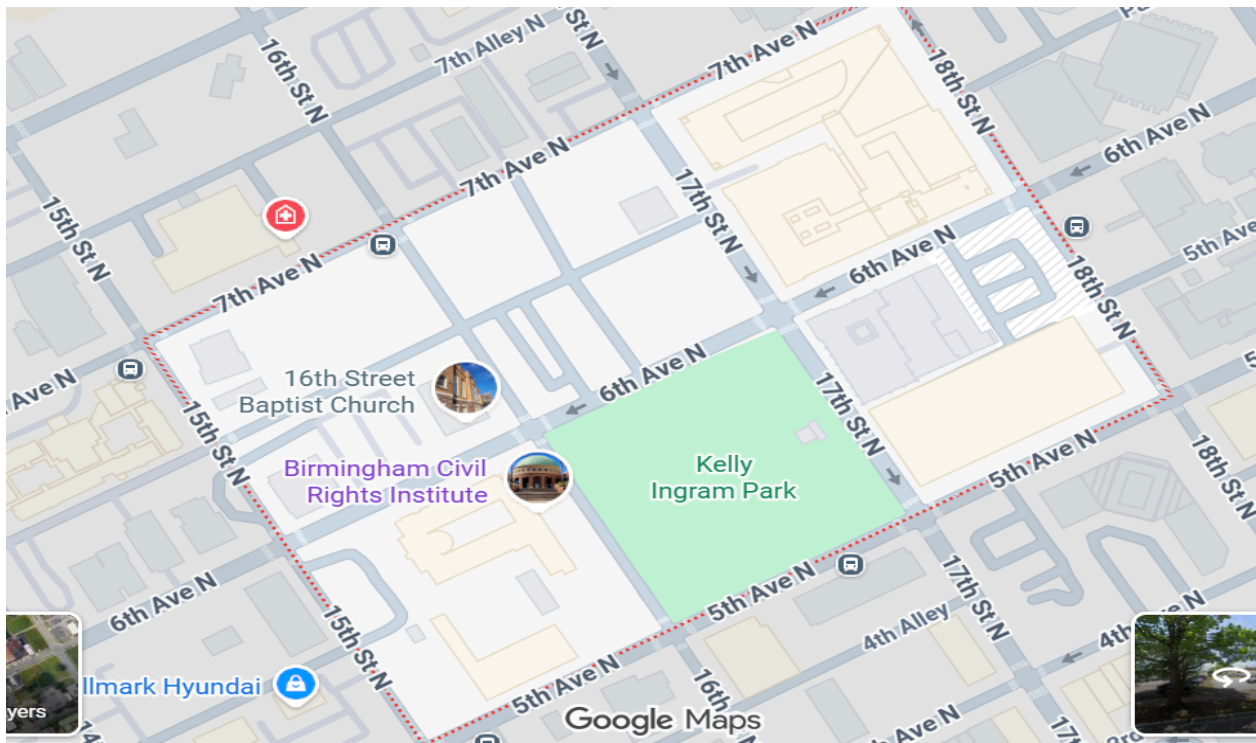

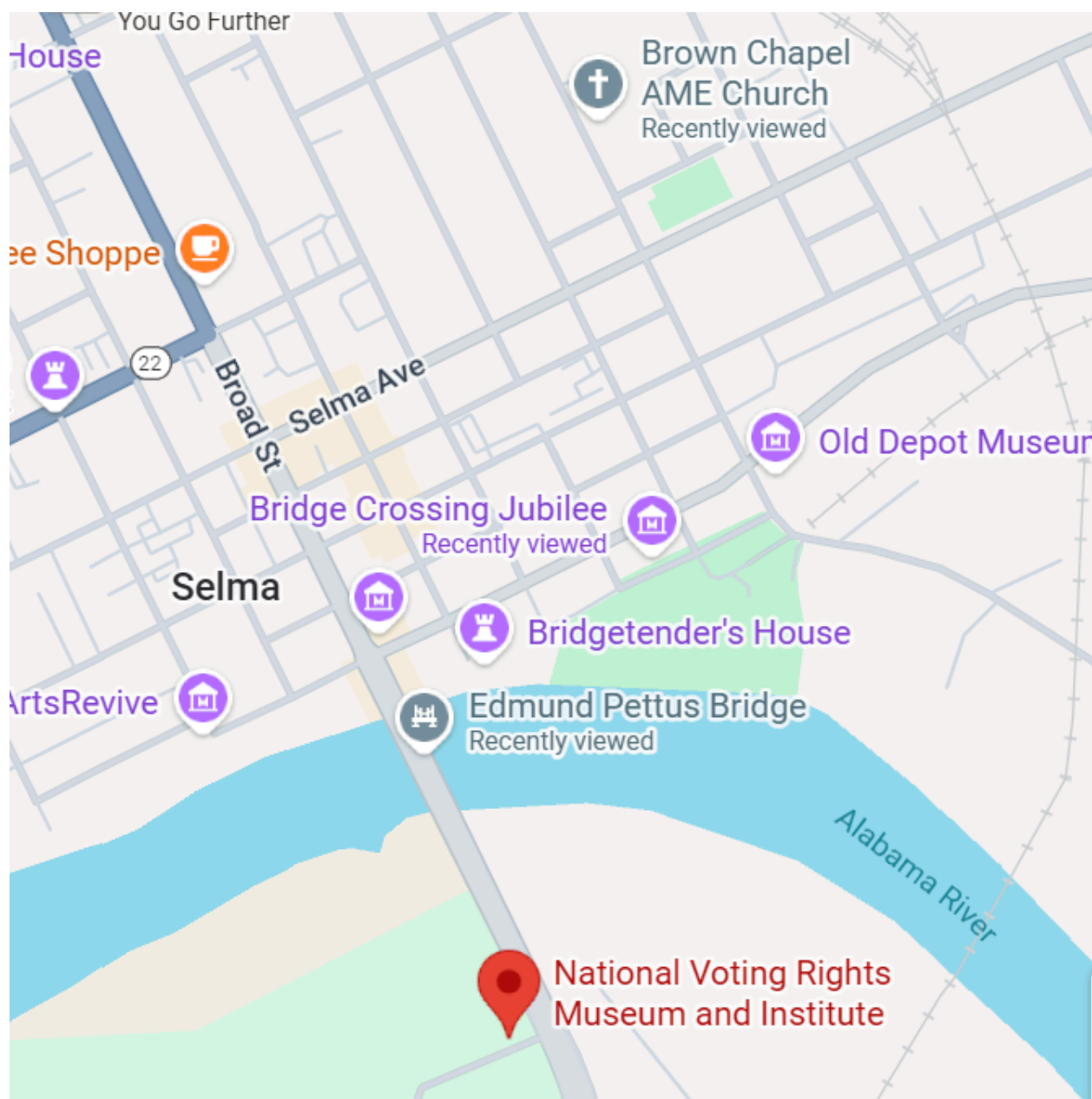
Map of Birmingham Civil Rights District
